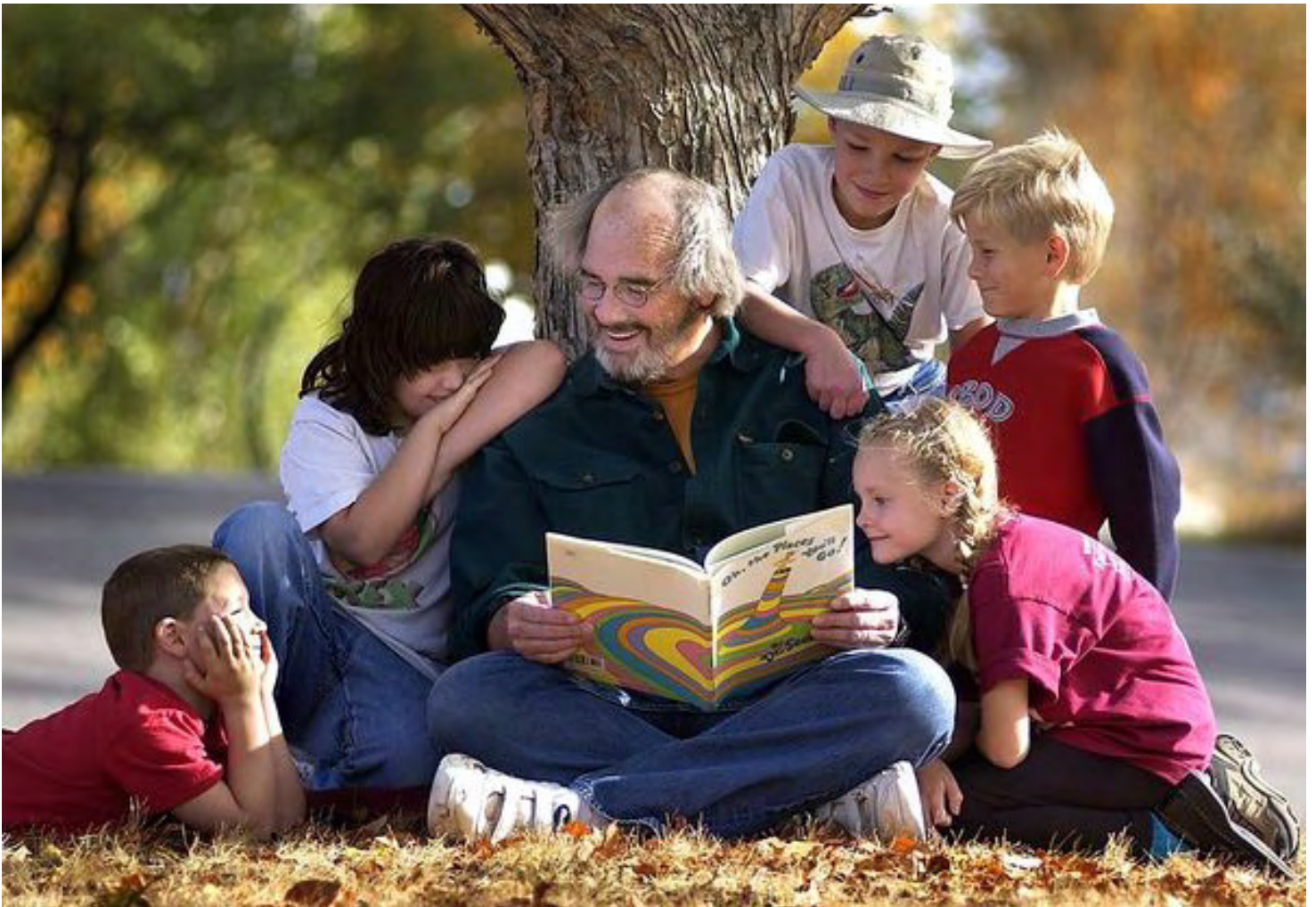


# TRIC/PLUK

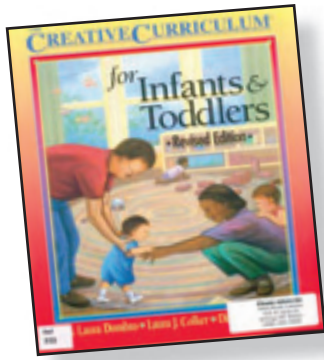

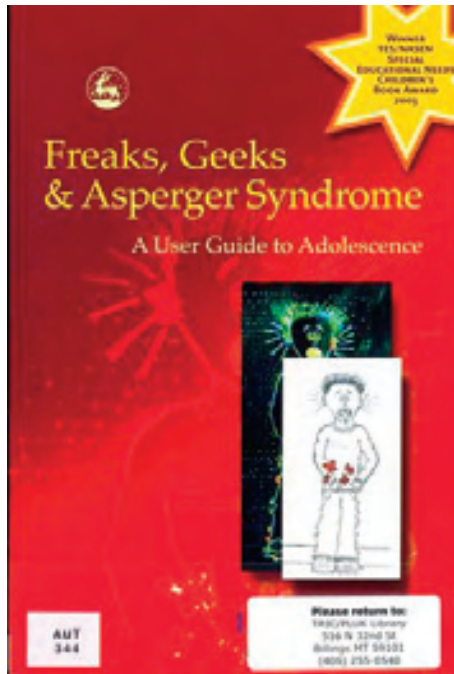

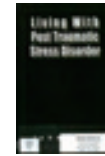


## ***Freaks, Geeks & Asperger Syndrome***

The TRIC/PLUK Library loans materials directly to individuals in Montana. Material can be accessed by walk-in, phone, FAX, E-mail, and the Internet. A portion of the TRIC/PLUK Library collection is entered in OCLC (Online Computer Library Center, Inc.), a database of more than 45,000 libraries around the world. This database grows daily as member institutions add new records every 12 seconds. Over 4,051,709 items are listed just in Montana libraries for users to access.
